a. SEEDS 30-Day Rule

SEEDS 30-Day Rule

- What does the 30-day rule apply to?
 - Actions with an 'action date' or an 'end date' (also known as trigger dates)
 - ♥DE, events, meetings, trainings, etc.
 - Does NOT apply to Partnerships or Implementation Stage
 - Partnerships due by end of fiscal year 9/30
 - Implementation Stages due twice a year on same date as SARNS (April and October)

SEEDS 30-Day Rule

- When does the 30-day rule go into effect?
 - Friday morning-July 13, 2018
- What does this mean for me?
 - All actions between from October 1 to July 1 should be in completed status.
 - Moving forward, you need to complete actions within 30 days of 'trigger date' which is the action date or the end date.

Action date/ end date: The date that the action was to take place.

Save the Dates for 30-day Rule Implementation:

- July 11th we will have the Database Refresh in anticipation of the launch- no action needed.
 - Live SEEDS will not be impacted, the Training environment data will be refreshed with Live SEEDS data.

- July 12th evening 30-day Rule will be deployed. (See attachment for more info.)
 - SEEDS will be down for approximately 1 hour
 - Cache will need to be cleared
 - Will provide more information about changes
- July 13th morning— 30-day Rule will be fully implemented



- The Farm Bill (aka: Agriculture Improvement Act of 2018) is currently in-between part I and II in the Conference Committee
 - Conference Committee: committee of the United States Congress made up by House of Representatives and Senate to resolve disagreements on a particular bill.
- Original draft of the Farm bill was dropped in April, went through a lot of revisions, and it failed to pass in May.
- Senate released their version in June 13. It is more SNAP-Ed friendly then the House version, which passed June 21.
- Obstacles for passing the Farm Bill:
 - The bill currently has two very different versions going into the Conference Committee, which may make it harder to pass
 - The bill discussion is also taking place at the same time of mid-term elections,
 - House Speaker Paul Ryan to retire
- Farm Bill expires September 30th
 - Possible delay is not impossible, or uncommon. There are advocates nationwide pushing Conference Committee to pass a version.
 - If it does happen, SNAP and SNAP-Ed will still be funded, but other discretionary programs (such as Farmers Market Promotion Program, Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program, and other programs we work with) would end until a budget is re-authorized.
 - SNAP-Ed format could stay the same, but with possible budget cuts or change in agencies. Currently, there are no exact plans
- Is the Farm Bill being used as a tool to pass other legislation?

- Unfortunately, yes. Congress goes in summer recess in August, and will have to explain it to their constituents.
- Feel free to a contact your local representatives as an individual, concerned citizen.
